Dave Bell provided a general BSL/PK update;

- Continuing to experience down turn
- Domestic market still going reasonably
- Plate business in backlog 4-5 weeks
- Infrastructure quite strong domestically
- Overall however prices still going down
- International market has spare capacity
   Positive still investigating/spending on project
- Positive still investigating/spending on projects \$400M spend on R&M and the like
- Mining leases update
  - S32 has submitted EIS statement. Next step is to collate responses and respond. This time next year a decision – 20 year mine life.

#### Incidents

- Emissions crossed Springhill Road from the Recycling area. Incident report submitted to EPA – working through the outcomes – Pollution Reduction project eg dust monitoring and additional water sprays
- Coke Ovens gas condensate—2 incidents leakage to ground – incident reports submitted to EPA.
- Incident involving instability of Blast Furnace—BF condensate emissions. We use a considerable amount of water to cool our furnace – rare event. No environmental consequences.
- 5 days after BF incident 12 dead fish in Allens Creek. No defined cause. Still open file with EPA

### Enquiries/Complaints

- Odour complaint from Cringila resident sulphur type smell. Wind direction aligned with the plant – potentially from our granulating operation.
- A member of public reported material on the road at Springhill Rd. Organised clean up.
- Resident on Flagstaff Rd complaining of light shining in backyard. Neighbours had cut down trees hence allowing light to shine through which hadn't previously. Culprit lights and are remedying.

- February 2020 commence 12 week preventative maintenance on the WGC outlet duct, stack and regenerator
- Bypass planned to commence mid February to mid May
  - Week of monitoring to make sure all going ok
  - Safety benefits
  - Monitoring stations located NW and SW of Sinter plant
- Net affect no change. Possibly some increases EPA installing ambient gauges to check.
   Contingencies in place.
- Offline will still be within the limits. Not too far off normal operations
- What does it emit? SO2, nitrous oxides, low
